CLINIC & BEHAVIORAL SUPPORTS

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES

Licensed social workers are trained to address a wide range of mental health issues and provide support to individuals looking to improve their mental health.

SPEECH-LANGUAGE PATHOLOGY

Speech and language skills are an integral part of an individual's social interactions and educational development. To improve children's communication skills, HCA's team of certified and licensed speech-language pathologists use child-friendly, playbased activities.

PHYSICAL THERAPY

Our New York State-licensed physical therapists use a play-based approach to engage children, tailoring interventions to their unique needs and motivators. They focus on building on existing movement skills to minimize factors affecting functional movement.

OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY

New York State-licensed occupational therapists work to increase functional participation by improving small motor skills, self-care, and sensory processing.

CHILDREN'S SERVICES

PRESCHOOL

HCA's education philosophy is that all children can learn, and their earliest years yield the most rapid growth and development. Our integrated preschool programs nurture and teach children with special needs alongside their general education peers, providing an enriching and diverse environment for each student.

EVALUATIONS & SCREENINGS

HCA conducts evaluations for children's developmental domains, including cognition, language, motor, social emotional, and sensory processing functions, to ensure they receive necessary support and services for social and academic success.

RESIDENTIAL SERVICES

INDIVIDUALIZED RESIDENTIAL ALTERNATIVES

HCA's 15 group homes provide 24-hour, personalized care for individuals eligible for OPWDD services by fostering a supportive family atmosphere to help them achieve their goals by making individualized choices.

INDIVIDUAL & FAMILY SUPPORT SERVICES

COMMUNITY AND DAY HABILITATION

Our Community and Day Habilitation programs aim to enhance each individual's independence through personalized plans that facilitate community inclusion, integration, and relationship building in a community setting or after-school respite.

RESPITE SERVICES

Our respite programs provide short-term care for people with developmental disabilities giving parents, families, and caregivers the opportunity to take a much-needed break. Services can be performed at home or in our certified respite house.

SELF-DIRECTED SERVICES

HCA offers support for individuals self-directing their budget and services, including administrative and billing assistance, hiring and training of staff, and maintenance of direct provider-purchased services.

SUPPORTED EMPLOYMENT SERVICES (SEMP)

Specially trained providers assist individuals in securing and maintaining employment by conducting assessments of their strengths, interests, and needs.











LUCA IS DEFYING ALL ODDS

Luca was born with a rare neurological condition called pontine tegmental cap dysplasia (PTCD). PTCD causes a range of symptoms, including hearing loss, ataxia, speech and language disorders, feeding and swallowing difficulties, heart malformations, and facial paralysis.

Doctors warned Carey, Luca's mother, that Luca might never be able to lift his head or eat on his own. After hearing this, Carey sought out early intervention services to give Luca the best chance of success. When reviewing the options, Carey admits she had never heard of Helping Celebrate Abilities but was relieved to discover HCA offered a comprehensive program to fit all of Luca's needs.



Luca started attending occupational and physical therapy at HCA when he was two months old. Working with his team of therapists, Luca quickly began reaching milestones and gaining strength, defying the initial prognosis. His occupational therapist, Lisa Williams, says he really is a superhero!

Luca has truly grown up at HCA and thinks of his therapist and teachers, who love him and want the best for him, as more like family.

Luca's first time holding his head up for two seconds while on his belly sparked celebrations after many months of physical therapy! We cheered on Luca after he independently crept on his hands and knees, and again when he took his first steps walking with an assistive device!

As Luca grew and adapted, enrolling in HCA's preschool program seemed like the natural next step for him, as he could continue his therapy sessions with familiar faces.

HCA ALUMNI: THEN & NOW

As a child, Anne experienced significant speech delays. At the time, services for children with disabilities were not as prevalent as they are today, and families faced a shortage of resources. Anne's parents learned about HCA and what the clinic was doing, so they brought her in for a comprehensive assessment. The assessment results recommended that Anne begin receiving speech therapy services two to three times per week.

Anne's mother recalls that the speech therapy sessions seemed more like play than treatment and attributes Anne's success to the comfortable environment at HCA. HCA's preschool and clinic services gave Anne the boost she needed to start kindergarten.

As Anne progressed through school, she discovered which methods of learning worked best for her. Her experience inspired her to pursue a degree in childhood education at SUNY Cortland. While in college, she worked as a direct support professional (DSP), assisting people with intellectual and developmental disabilities. She enjoyed her job as a direct support professional so much that she decided to dedicate herself to assisting people with special needs after graduation.

Anne's current role as Director of Provider Relations entails collaborating with a variety of organizations, including HCA, to inform people with developmental disabilities about available services and how to access them

Anne and her parents credit HCA's early intervention services for helping her grow into the person she is today. They continue to advocate for HCA, spreading the word to anyone who could benefit from its services.

Jenna, who has been working with Austin for four years, says he's becoming more independent every day. She has seen how his confidence has grown and how willing he is to try new things.


Next time you are at a hockey game or watching a parade, keep an eye out for Austin and his infectious smile; it will definitely make your day.
